






Number of Students by Host Countries





Comparison of Top 10 Host Countries Between the Surveys





Percentage of Host Countries for Internships (SMT)





Type of Stay Abroad by Gender





Participants by Year of Scholarship Completion





Further Stays Abroad During the Study Course





Participants' Highest Level of Education





Country of First Employment by Type of Stay





First Employment / Gross Monthly Income





First Employment / Gross Monthly Income by Gender





Country of Current Employment by Type of Stay





Current Employment / Gross Monthly Income





Retrospective Perceptions on the Development of Skills




