The transatlantic partnership in higher education is a strategic and enduring alliance featured prominently in the EU-US policy priorities and agenda. In a world of global crisis and geopolitical tensions, there is an increasing need for intensified transatlantic collaborations in research, student mobility and people-to-people exchanges, as they can valuably contribute to reinforcing our shared values such as democracy, academic freedom and pluralism while making our societies more resilient to face the challenges ahead.

This Washington, DC roundtable is the continuation of the Transatlantic high-level roundtable convened by DAAD and IIE in Brussels (October 9, 2023) in advance of the EU-US Summit in Washington, DC (October 20, 2023). The 2023 joint statement released from the EU-US Summit reinforced the critical importance of the transatlantic relationship through people-to-people exchanges and included a commitment by EU and US leadership to increase support for academic exchanges over the next five years. The roundtable will also be informed by the recent EU Delegation to US and US Department of State stakeholder event (February 14, 2024).

The Washington, DC roundtable will continue the exchange of ideas and discussions of meaningful measures to strengthen and expand transatlantic higher education collaborations and partnerships.

The aim of the roundtable will be to:

- Map the current opportunities and explore a common EU-US framework in higher education.
- Discuss the critical importance of supporting and expanding current programs with a focus on creating equitable and accessible opportunities.
- Engage academia, industry, and government in innovative collaborations for increasing research, student mobility and people-to-people exchanges.
