Global Target for Refugee Higher Education and Self-Reliance Enrolment of 15% of refugee youth in higher education by 2030, leading to accredited tertiary level qualifications.

122.6 M forcibly displaced

32M individuals under the UNHCR mandate

15M are children of school-going age

5M are university age

71% live in low-to middle income countries

50% of refugee children are out of school


For those in school, 45% have access to secondary education

76% are in protracted displacement

7% have access to tertiary education

45% of refugees reside in countries with unrestricted access to formal employment

Why higher education in emergencies?



Objectives of the Global Compact on Refugees:

- 1. Ease the pressures on host countries
- 2. Enhance refugee self-reliance
- 3. Expand access to third-country solutions
- 4. Support conditions in countries of origin for return in safety and dignity

Priority Challenges and Opportunities:

- 1. Prioritise inclusion and integrate refugees into development investments in refugee hosting countries
- 2. Capture, amplify and replicate examples of partnerships between higher education institutions in refugee and non-refugee hosting countries
- 3. Define *role of development actors* in expanding access to higher education for refugees bridging the humanitarian-development nexus
- 4. Strengthen position of higher education institutions to respond in emergency situations through a combination of anticipatory actions and improved coordination via the *Interagency Steering Group on Higher Education in Emergencies*
